Hawthorne Elementary Future To Be Determined Soon

Ed Zimmer, LPS School Board member, speaking at a meeting at Southwest High, said that a decision about the future of Hawthorne Elementary would be made at the School Board's October 9th meeting.

While the school board has been in the process of drawing new boundaries for Lincoln Schools, it was proposed to close Hawthorne and send students to Eastridge, Randolph, and other schools. The building could then be re-purposed, although there are no definite plans about what that purpose would be.

The school board has been holding open meetings to solicit public reaction to the proposal. Parents and interested residents have been rising to voice their opposition to the closing of Hawthorne as an elementary school.

The School Board will hold an open meeting at Hawthorne School **Tuesday, September 4th at 7 p.m.** All interested people are urged to attend and share their thoughts about the future of Hawthorne.

Realizing that many working residents are finding it difficult to attend School Board meetings, Michelle Strand, President of Hawthorne PTO, has created an internet petition drive to allow folks to voice their support for keeping Hawthorne Elementary open. WNA members passed a resolution at their August 2nd meeting to oppose the closing of Hawthorne Elementary. The WNA Board of Directors is studying the issue and will render their recommendation soon.

Topics & Speakers Set for Sept. and Oct. WNA Meetings

The **September 6th** WNA meeting will be addressing the proposed closing of Hawthorne Elementary School, which is located at 300 S. 48th Street. Ed Zimmer, who is the Lincoln Board of Education District 4 representative, which includes most of the Witherbee neighborhood area, will be attending to address questions. Neighborhood attendance and discussion at this meeting will be extremely important since the WNA Board will be voting on and deciding what their official position is on this matter. Also, Gregg and Cindy Trautman will be our guest speakers for September and they will be updating us on the construction of their 5,000 square foot office building located near S 37th and 'O' Streets.

The **October 4th** WNA meeting will have the proposed new Lancaster County jail as the main program topic. Plans are to have an appointed member of the newly created county jail review committee as our guest speaker, who will present an overview of the project and answer questions concerning this proposed \$94 million project.

They are as follows:

- Northeast corner N. 33rd & 'O' Streets new Starbucks store and other retail to open when new building is fully leased
- S. 37th & 'O' Streets (on 37th) construction underway of a one-story 5,000 sq. ft. office building
- 145 S. 40th Street Calvary Cemetery is installing a new wrought fence, landscaping and other improvements
- Southeast corner S. 45th & 'O' Streets (4501 'O' Street)- Urban Development currently working with the property owner to redevelop this 14,420 sq. ft. lot is zoned H-2 (highway Business District)
- Stormwater Improvement Project, N 50th & 'R' Streets and N 52nd & 'O' Streets - bids have been received by Public Works and work will soon start when contract is awarded
- Paving Project, N. 50th Street from 'O' to 'R' Street- bids have been received by Public Works and work will start when contact is awarded
- Demolition at 5000 'O' Street for new \$15 million Hy-Vee Store- site currently being cleared for redevelopment / Hy-Vee will start construction fall 2007 and store will open spring/summer 2008
- Midtown Commons at S. 50th & 'N' Streets Westgate Bank @ Midtown, 50th & 'O' Streets, has donated all the landscaping that has been installed by Finke's Nursery for this public greenspace
- Midtown Commons at S. 50th & 'N' Streets Lincoln Parks & Recreation Department has been maintaining this greenspace area and will seed it to grass this fall. Urban Development has also obtained a grant that will establish an on-site water source that can be used to water trees, plants and turf. Funding is for a water tap, meter, backflow preventer and quick-couplers
- Urban Development is continuing to work with interested developers to redevelop various commercial sites located adjacent to the northeast corner of N 48th & 'O' Streets

Our first ever Celebration at Woods Park event that was held on July 15th was fun and very successful. Please read more about it in this newsletter. Thanks to all who helped make this neighborhood event possible. I know we will be doing it again next year and foresee it becoming an annual neighborhood event.

The proposed closing of Hawthorne Elementary School, 300 S. 48th Street, at the end of the 2007-08 school year is now being discussed by WNA, the Hawthorne PTO and those who have their children enrolled there. The possible closure will be discussed at a public meeting hosted by the LPS board at Hawthorne on Tuesday, September 4th, at 7 PM., It is expected that the school board will hear a first reading of the proposal at its September 25th regular meeting and act on the proposal at its October 9th meeting. As residents of Witherbee, I encourage all of you to be involved and informed since the ultimate decision will effect our neighborhood. Witherbee Neighbors Welcome Newcomers to Stuhr Park

Saturday morning, April 21, over 25 Witherbee neighbors gathered to welcome seven new residents to Stuhr Park and help them get settled in their new home. The neighbors were people. The newcomers were trees. Yes, that's right. They were **trees**. The neighbors were eager participants. The trees were fortunate recipients of a lot of tender, loving care.

West Gate Bank, one of our neighborhood's newest businesses along "O" street, partnered with us by providing hot coffee and cold juice as we gathered for the event. Total cost of the seven trees from Finke's Nursery was \$1,189. One- third of the cost was paid for by a tree-planting grant from the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum, one-third by the Lincoln Parks & Recreation Department and one-third by WNA.

Witherbee neighbors, armed with shovels, rakes, gloves, and a lesson in tree planting by City Forester Steve Schwab, carefully planted the trees and mulched them. Add a generous helping of water and you have a wonderfully successful neighborhood project which will have long lasting effects. (Thanks to all who helped that morning!)

Several participants have volunteered to be Foster Parents to the trees. The foster parents' role is to make sure the trees get enough water during the extra hot part of the summer. They agreed to deliver 10 gallons of water to their foster tree each week that it doesn't rain. And, yes, there have been several weeks since the trees were planted that we have not had rain. The trees are doing well.

Late in September of 1916, 16 presidents ago, when the US population was approximately one-third of what it is today, in the midst of WWI, when our nation's population was more rural than urban, he was born. Loren Gerischer came into this world on a farm somewhere between Oskaloosa and Beacon in Iowa.

A five year old brother, Glen, and a 2 year old sister, Gayle, welcomed him. His father farmed and his mother was a farm wife. Two years later in 1918, one more sister, Doris, would come along. Medicine being what it was Band-Aids were not invented until 1920 and penicillin came into being to treat bacterial infections in 1928. Neither of these advancements would have helped. Loren's mother had contracted tuberculosis, an infectious disease that typically attacks the lungs. A treatment for tuberculosis wouldn't be developed until 1943. By then his parents had been dead for 18 years. When Loren was five his father died. His mother would follow two years later, both from the same disease.

Aunts would take in the siblings, but not all together. At different times Loren lived in these Iowa towns, Muscatine, Iowa City, Des Moines, and then St. Paul, Minnesota. He spent some time in country school. Education wasn't stressed, though he would have liked to have had more schooling. Social Security was established in 1935, the year Loren turned 19.

Hitchhiking was prevalent and an accepted form of transport, especially in the days of World War II. So Loren hitchhiked to Wyoming and worked for a time on a sheep ranch.

He has held a series of jobs: bellhop, janitor, night watchman, dishwasher, and other jobs as needed. He has formerly worked at the Department of Roads. He worked at the Lincoln Country Club from 1967 - 1995. He worked at the Lincoln Airport for a few years beyond that. By this time, he was in his eighties.

While in Lincoln, he lived in town, then moved to First street across from B and B Greenhouse. Eventually, he moved to 37th Street, a couple houses South of O Street. His cemetery plot in Wyuka is paid for and Loren has been know to quip, "Yeah, when I die, I'm just moving across the street." He now resides in a duplex on L Street.

Loren averages between 10-20,000 steps per day. He walks everywhere and is typically in the company of his dog. There was Fallon, the husky, then Sable, the collie, and most recently, he was spotted about town with Mike, the pug. Sadly, Mike was hit by a car while crossing 33rd Street and died on July 3. These dogs have been constant companions, unless Loren is catching

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the bus or going to his volunteer job of folding the church bulletins every Friday.

He has made fast friends with a couple that formerly lived on Woods Avenue. He came into their lives shortly after the untimely death of their infant son, "It is truly a blessing to know him. Every day he demonstrates how to live a quiet, simple life. He was undaunted by the October snowstorm of 1997. We looked out of our window and here comes Loren and Fallon trudging up the middle of the street," stated Steve Mach.



Loren is not much of a Loren and Mike in good times fisherman, but will talk at

length about fish worms. He possesses an almost encyclopedic knowledge of animals.

He loves to read, esp. Hardy Boys mysteries. He enjoys working jigsaw puzzles. He doesn't own a television.

Much has changed in Loren's ninety years of life. In the year Loren was born, Albert Einstein completed his mathematical formulation of a general theory of relativity. What is relative to Loren remains pretty plain: health, well-being, getting another faithful, furry, four-legged companion, and his friends and family.
