The Koperski family moved into the neighborhood in the spring of 2006 from Wahoo. They like to say the neighborhood found them rather than the other way around, explaining that friends notified them that the home at 721 S. 37th was for sale. On a day that it was open for viewing, they looked at the home at 6:00 p.m. and by 9:00 p.m. they owned it. Typically, David and Lisa don't make quick decisions on major issues such a home purchase, but friends had told them about the strong positive character of the neighborhood and with other people looking at the house built in 1920 they submitted the winning offer.

Fast forward to 2014, the family of five was growing (Juliana is now 12, Dominic 10 and Lydia 8) as David and Lisa were expectant with son Aidan – now 1. The kitchen was small and had a low and oddly angled ceiling, and there was only one bathroom. David and Lisa wanted to stay in the neighborhood so they decided on a 14 x 24 foot addition. In the expansion project, the old kitchen became a new second full bathroom, the first floor addition added a new kitchen and master bedroom, and the basement addition added another bedroom and bathroom.

Using Protected Bikeways, 17 blocks of downtown bike protection

What is a Cycle Track? One of the newest pieces of infrastructure added to downtown will take some getting used to. Motorists, pedestrians and cyclists are learning the new rules. You will be surprised how the streetscape on N street has changed if you have not been downtown recently. Even during the winter month cyclists are using the new Cycle Track to get to work, to shop and for recreation.

A cycle track, also known as a protected bikeway, combines the user experience of a separated path with a conventional bike lane. Unlike a bike lane, however, a cycle track offers protection from traffic using grade separation, bollards, curbs, parked cars, a landscaped area or some other kind of physical barrier. A cycle track is also physically separated distinct from the sidewalk. Widely used in many European countries, cycle tracks are becoming popular in may US cities because they offer the safety and comfort of a separated path with the convenience of a bike lane.

The City of Lincoln has been proactive in providing education on how to use this new bike path and educate motorists to safely navigate the streets without causing accidents and injuring cyclists.

More information can be found on the city's website at www.lincoln.ne.gov and search for 'N Street Cycle Track.' You will find helpful instructional video and great articles.

"Lincoln is very excited to be the home of Nebraska's first cycle track," Mayor Beutler said. "The separation of bikes and motor vehicles provides an extra measure of safety. But, it's very important for the public to learn how to navigate this stretch of "N" Street, which includes traffic control devices at every intersection for cyclists, motorist and pedestrians."

The cycle track provides a connection from the Arena and West Haymarket to the Antelope Valley Trails, a critical link in the City's 128-mile trail network. "In addition to providing important trail connections, the cycle track promotes healthy living and contributes to the livability, excitement and vibrancy of our 21st century city," Beutler said. He noted that Nelnet cited the "N" Street Cycle Track in its announcement about the company's plans to turn the old Windstream building into offices for its employees. The project is part of the Telegraph District, the redevelopment of the 21st and "N" Street area by Nelnet and Speedway Properties.

The cycle track is funded from both public and private sources, including a \$340,000 donation from the Great Plains Trails Network (GPTN).

Watch for posting of links on Witherbee Facebook, website and in emails. Since Witherbee is so close to downtown we predict more cyclists using the new Bike Way and we want to do our part keeping everyone safe. David and Lisa did much of the demolition work themselves beginning in October of 2014. Demolition work on 95 years of redecorating in the kitchen revealed five layers of flooring and wall paper and tile behind the wainscoting. Excavation began in December 2014 and despite miscellaneous delays the majority of the work was done by last summer. One step that made the project bearable was that the new kitchen was working before they had to tear out the old kitchen.

Including some ideas from friend and architect Kevin Clark, they designed the expansion with the intention of maintaining the character of the older home and staying for a long time. The first floor now has the kitchen, bathroom and bedroom, all good sized, which means they won't need to climb a set of stairs when they are older. The family says they functioned OK before the expansion with just one bathroom, but having three is really appreciated by everyone.

Pastor Tom joined the People's City Mission in November 2004 and has helped the organization through a period of very rapid growth. This year the Mission will provide shelter, food, clothing and medical care to over 30,000 unique individuals. It also operates the third largest free medical clinic in the U.S. During Pastor Tom's 11 years the Mission has provided food, shelter, clothing and medical care to almost 250,000 people.

The People's City Mission was founded in 1907 and serves as Lincoln's primary homeless shelter. The Mission provides emergency housing for nearly 350 homeless men, women, and children every night of the year. Those individuals staying at the Mission receive casework, life skill training and three meals a day.

The Mission receives most of its funding from private donations and, per Charity Navigator, gets almost 90% of all donations directly to the need.

Witherbee Day at the Pioneer Telephone Museum Feb 7th 2016

The Frank H. Woods Telephone Pioneer Museum here in Lincoln may soon become history unless they get an extension on their lease or find a new location. Witherbee neighbors, friends, and anyone wanting to take a LAST look at this Lincoln gem are invited to join us at the museum February 7th, 1 to 4 p.m. at 2047 M Street.

Museum staff, including our neighbor Jim Ihrie a member and volunteer, will be on hand for guided tours and demonstrations of working relics. Join us for a walk down memory lane for some of us and a great education for others.

The building that houses the tourist attraction on the eastern edge of downtown sits in the heart of an area that developers have targeted for a 60-acre housing and retail project west of Antelope Valley Parkway and north of Lincoln High School. Speedway Properties and Nelnet have created the East Downtown Development Corp. to redevelop the area between O and K streets and Antelope Valley Parkway and 24th Street. The Telegraph District would include office space for Nelnet, retail and hundreds of new residential units. The current one-year lease with Windstream, the owner of the 12,000-squarefoot museum building, expires March 31. The end for the museum as we know it now unless a new home is found.

The 400 members of the Frank H. Woods Telephone Pioneer Association are worried that the developers' plans will mean the demise of their museum, an attraction that houses artifacts dating back to 1928. Nearly 20 years ago, the artifacts were ensured a permanent home of their own when the Independent Telephone Pioneer Association gave the local group \$40,000 to renovate the building at 2047 M St. and convert it into a museum. Volunteer members of the 501(c)(3) worked two years to whip the building into a tourist site, moved artifacts that the phone companies had worked nearly 70 years to collect and preserve, and opened the museum in October 1996.

In the past 19-plus years, the museum has drawn visitors from every state in the union, virtually every Canadian province, and 39 countries.

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Haulers Helping the Homeless

CURBSIDE Recycling Program A WIN-WIN FOR ALL OF US!!

The People's City Mission is teaming up with Lincoln's garbage haulers to provide curbside recycling of unwanted clothing which will be turned into cash donations to support the Mission's services. By reducing waste and helping to extend the life of Lincoln's landfill, this effort will also help to feed Lincoln's homeless.

The Environmental Protection Agency estimates ONLY 15 percent of unwanted clothing and shoes nationwide is donated or recycled, while 85 percent goes in the trash. This equates to 70 pounds of discarded clothing per person per year, which would mean Lincoln residents throw away more than 18 million pounds of clothing per year, based on the city's population.

Bagged clothing, shoes, purses, belts, and other textiles, in any condition, will be picked up at residential curbsides by your garbage hauler the same day as current trash service. Place unwanted clothing items

in trash bags and tie with a green "recycling ribbon" for easy identification. The recycling ribbons can be obtained for free at any HyVee, Super Saver or Russ's Market. Check to see if your Refuse Hauler is participating in this program. Not all of them are. If not you can still help by taking your bag to one of the red and white drop boxes.

Please! <u>Attend the Witherbee meeting March 3rd.</u> <u>Meet pastor Tom Barber and bring your questions.</u> What can I recycle? In any condition? How and where do I obtain the green recycling ribbons? When do I put the bags out for my garbage hauler? What genius invented this easy way for me to recycle? It's the first of its kind in the nation. Another reason why I love Lincoln!

Witherbee Neighborhood Association supports the Woods Tennis Center bubble replacement capital improvement project with a \$500 donation.

By a vote of the membership, the Witherbee Neighborhood Association supports the bubble replacement project, and backed up that support with a \$500 donation to the fundraising effort. Several years ago a previous plan was turned back with vocal opposition from Witherbee and other area groups. Staff and supporters of Woods Tennis Center have worked with area groups to address concerns. Relocating the proposed new buildings, emphasizing community outreach and education have turned around opposition. The Witherbee Neighborhood Association and the Woods Park Neighborhood Association have each given \$500 donations to support the current plan.

My children graduated from Randolph Elementary, Lefler Junior High and Lincoln High where I was active in PTA and all of their many activities. We attended St. Teresa's Church. The solid support from neighbors and the good friends that last a lifetime have always given OUR neighborhood the feeling of an extended family.

When my children were growing up we also loved living in "midtown" because we could travel a mile in any direction to find all the services we needed. Or, we were only minutes to the edge of town in any direction. This helped us arrive at school and events promptly-well, most of the time. This was very important when I had three children in two or three schools for 22 years.

My son, Andy Beecham, and his wife, Cathy are partners at FUSE Co-Working. Their daughters are Katie, 13 and Jenna, 10. My daughter, Beth, a nurse at Bryan Heart Institute + and her husband, Kyle Rupp, live in Lincoln with their daughter, Tabitha, 5. My youngest, Shannon, is a Marketing and Public Relations Specialist at Geary Community Hospital. After many years on the move with the Army, she and her husband, Ryan Rosauer, settled in Junction City, Kansas with their children Abby, 13 and David, 9. My three kids and I delivered the Lincoln Journal Star in our immediate neighborhood for 13 years which truly gets you right up to your neighbor's doorstep. While remembering frozen fingers, wet cement and early alarms on Sunday morning, we also recall the time a neighbor treated us to a cold lemonade on a hot summer's day.

During the summer of 1976, our new Woods Avenue neighbors organized an outstanding block party which included all of the 57 homes between 33rd to 38th on Woods Avenue. It was complete with a live band and kids' competitions. That tradition continued for 34 years and became an amazing bonding event for all the old neighbors as well as a wonderful welcome to the new neighbors. It spawned a book club and the annual Christmas cookie exchange. Each year I have been asked when we are going to have the block party again. My response has been "LET"S DO IT!"

With 52 years as a cosmetologist and wig specialist, I worked alone in a home beauty salon at both 3435 N and 3510 Woods Ave. before moving my business, O'Hair Salon, to 42nd & O in 1984. The 11-block commute is appreciated. Throughout the years, many teens from the neighborhood have cleaned and swept-up for our sisterhood of talented stylists. I currently continue to create smiles for those with extreme hair loss.

There is a brick at Sunken Gardens to commemorate the marriage of Mary and Steve Schwab on August 30, 1997. Steve enjoyed the big yard at Woods Ave and planted many trees. He found new friends as a charter member of the Witherbee Neighborhood Association and is a Past President. He was also a board member for many years. We enjoyed working together on special projects for WNA. I've had great fun in the past supplying food for annual meetings and working on neighborhood cleanup as well as the summertime swim/ice cream party at Woods Pool. I would encourage anyone to join in the fun.

Witherbee neighborhood's boundaries are 33rd to 56th, & O to Randolph. This is truly the grass-roots of organizations. My current interest in being on the Board of WNA is energizing all the wonderful people of the Witherbee neighborhood to become more involved with one another through WNA. There is an amazing amount to be learned from one another and also from the speakers at each month's meeting. Special projects that take only a little time, done by someone of any age, can produce results that last for years.



The association was born from the need for a special



zoning project and resulted in most of the properties in WNA being down-zoned to R2. Do you know what that means for you?? Do you know how many owner-occupied homes are in our neighborhood?
