

MAY 4th, we are honored to have former Senator Ken Haar join us and share his thoughts and views on the ever concerning topic of climate change. Ken Haar is a builder (he planned & built an energy efficient house with his own labor), an educator (he taught science & math for 20 years), and a public servant (he served 8 years

on the Lincoln City Council and has just completed 8 years in the Nebraska Legislature, where he championed for renewable energy and climate change).

Ken is an avid outdoors man and finds backpacking and trail-building in the mountains as his favorite get-aways. Senator Haar lives in the country near Lincoln with my wife Christine. His three grandchildren have been the major motivation for his work on climate change.

The title of Senator Haar's presentation is a Yogi Berra quote: "The Future Ain't What It Used To Be"—Predictions For Climate Change".

JUNE 1st, Witherbee Neighborhood Association will be hosting discussions surrounding our recent property tax evaluations. A city official will be in attendance to explain the evaluation process, how a protest can be filed and answer questions regarding homeowner taxes. 

HAPPY STATEHOOD DAY NEBRASKA!!

March 1st, 1867, our state officially joined the Union when President Andrew Jackson signed the Proclamation for admittance in the city of Washington. Fast forward 150 years and here we are celebrating the birthday of our great state!!

The day was filled with many moments of celebration and reflection starting with the presentation of the new Nebraska Statehood stamp at the Capitol Rotunda. The stamp features an image of Sandhill Cranes flying over the Platte River and was taken by Nebraska native photographer, Michael Forsberg. This presentation was followed by the Pony Express delivery of the original Nebraska statehood proclamation along the west side of the Capital and actor portrayals of Nebraska historical figures, Willa Cather, Chief Standing Bear and Buffalo Bill Cody. The Capital's Legislative Chamber was packed to overflowing for the official ceremony hosted by Lieutenant Governor Mike Foley and Governor Pete Ricketts. This ceremony included the singing of "Happy Birthday" by Lincoln grade school children and our own state song, "Beautiful Nebraska" sung by the Waverly High School vocal group. The audience was also very fortunate to hear vocalist, Hannah Huston sing inspiring renditions of America the Beautiful and the Star Spangled Banner. The ceremony concluded with the reading of the poem, Nebraska: A Treasured State, written by Nebraska State Poet, Twyla M. Hansen. It is a beautiful portrayal of Nebraska, it's people, our past and our future. If you have not had the chance to read it, please take the time to look up a copy!!



There continues to be many events celebrating this historic moment for our state. The Nebraska History Museum is showcasing a painting exhibit by Central City native and artist, Todd Williams'. The exhibit is titled "Legacy of Nebraska" and has paintings that include all 93 counties while depicting the past 150 years of Nebraska history. Additionally, there are multiple activities for school children throughout the state that teach in depth Nebraska history with opportunities to visit our state capitol and other historical sites. Living legacy opportunities will be present by planting a tree in honor of a loved one and a Union Pacific train will travel the state in a rare, three day tour with stops at many Nebraska communities.

As Nebraskans, we have much to be proud of and 2017 should be a year of celebrating our past and looking forward to a future filled with all the amazing attributes that make up our great state.

Peddler Permits

Officer Cassi Nissen from Lincoln Police Department

Every year, as the weather gets warmer, we see an increase in door-to-door peddlers coming through Lincoln. Lincoln requires peddlers to obtain a permit (LMC 5.36) and the application includes a criminal background check. A person is not eligible for a permit if they have been convicted of a felony or a crime of moral turpitude in the last 10 years. There are many permits that get denied based on our background check. However, no background check can be all encompassing. It is important to maintain your awareness of personal safety whenever you have someone knock on your front door.

A few important facts about Peddler Permits you should know:

- Peddlers can operate any day of the week between the hours of 8AM-8PM.
- Peddlers must show their permit to any police officer or any occupant of a home upon request.
- All Peddler Permits will have an expiration date printed on them, not to exceed one year from the date of issue.

If someone comes to your home trying to sell something, you can ask for their permit and they are required to show you. Check the expiration date on the permit. If you are suspicious of someone, call LPD at 402-441-6000. If they do not have a permit, you should call the police. This is a misdemeanor law violation. When you call, give as much information as possible, hair, clothing, gender, vehicle involved, etc. Let the police department be the one to decide if something needs further investigation!

40th Lincoln Marathon Sunday May 7th, 2017

The 40th Lincoln Marathon is one month away. This event hosts over 14,000 runners and thousands of spectators. The route highlights Lincoln's beautiful neighborhoods, parks and the University of Nebraska. The event will start at 7 am on Sunday May 7th and will end around 2 pm. We encourage Lincoln residents who need to travel during the race to be aware of the route and plan an alternative route. During the race it is often faster to avoid the race course.

The race will close the following roads:

- 17th St - Vine to South • South St - 17th to Sheridan •
- Sheridan - South to 48th • 48th - Calvert to Highway 2 bike path • 27th and Highway (north bound) • 20th - Hwy 2 to Harrison • Harrison - 20th to 10th • 10th - Single lane open from Harrison to Memorial Stadium
- Normal - J st to 70th (one lane closed to eastbound traffic only)

South 70th Street will not have any lane closures. The majority of the runners will run the half marathon. Runners will have the right of way during the event. If possible, and only when safe to do so, officers will direct vehicles across the course. We will send a reminder of the race the week before and will include a map at that time.

Annual WNA Cleanup is Saturday, May 6th

The annual WNA Spring cleanup event will be on Saturday, May 6th from 8 am to Noon. The collection site will be along M Street directly North of Bryan Community School.

This is a great opportunity to clean up your home, garage & yard and safely dispose of your unwanted items.

Dump It! Many items, such as mattresses & box springs and old furniture can be disposed of by bringing them to the collection area.

Recycle It! EcoStores Nebraska, located at 530 West P Street, has generously provided a trailer to accept construction material and items such as windows and doors from building/remodeling projects as well as leftover lawn and landscaping materials.

Goodwill Industries will recycle and reuse most of the electronics and household items collected.

All used tires are taken to Firestone Complete Auto Care at 300 N 66th Street to be recycled. Complete Auto Care has generously agreed to recycle the tires for free.

The metal & household appliances (washers, dryers, stoves, refrigerators, etc) are hauled to Alter Metal Recycling.

Mulch It! A limited number of Brush disposal coupons will be available. These coupons are good all summer and can be used to haul a load of brush to the Lincoln Transfer Station for free.

Pick it Up! We need many volunteers to help pick up litter along the major streets rights of way, around the schools and

in the neighborhood parks. This is a great way to get some exercise and help make the neighborhood look great! Does your high school student need service hours to graduate? Litter pick up counts!

Items that CANNOT be accepted include trash, leaves, grass clippings, liquids of any kind (including paint, thinners, stains) ammunition/explosives, LP gas cylinders and CRT televisions.

If you need help hauling items to the collection site call Mike Kreikemeier at 402-477-9194 to make an appointment. The items must be easily accessible and placed near the curb if possible for our volunteers to pickup.

Many volunteers are required to make this cleanup event a success. Please consider joining us for a few hours to help clean up the neighborhood. We also need volunteers with pickup trucks and/or trailers. Vouchers are provided to volunteer haulers to help defray the cost of gas. This cleanup event is funded by a grant from "Keep Lincoln and Lancaster County Beautiful". Food and beverages are donated by Midtown Hy-Vee. Refuse hauling is provided by Niederhaus Refuse Services at a discounted rate.

LINCOLN PAINT-A-THON

The Lincoln Paint-a-Thon brings together volunteers to paint the exterior of homes owned by low-income individuals who are over the age of 65 or permanently disabled. The program is designed for homeowners who cannot afford to hire to have the work done and do not have the physical ability to do it themselves.

- There is no charge to the homeowner.
- A committee selects the recipients from the pool of applications based on the greatest need, the condition of the house and the availability of donation funds and volunteers.
- Recipients can choose from a handful of pre-selected paint colors.
- All applications must be received by June 1, 2017.
- Selected homeowners will be notified by June 23, 2017.
- The painting will be done on August 19, 2017.
- The application is available at www.paintathon.org and can either be completed online or printed off and mailed in to BuildUP, c/o Marshall Ford, 1929 South 23rd St., Lincoln, NE 68502.

City Council Candidate Forum March 16

The Witherbee Neighborhood Association co-hosted a Lincoln City Council candidate forum March 16 at the Auld Center in Antelope Park. All eight candidates for the primary election attended: Deb Andrews, Bennie Shobe, Lou Braatz, Brayden McLaughlin, Maggie Mae Squires, Tom Nesbitt, Leirion Gaylor Baird (incumbent), and Roy Christensen (incumbent). From the primary election six candidates advanced to the general election, May 2, where three candidates will be elected for the at-large city council positions.

Other sponsors included the Nebraska League of Conservation Voters, NeighborWorks Lincoln, Friends of Wilderness Park, Planned Parenthood of the Heartland, and Everett Neighborhood Association.

The audience of approximately 300 people so rigorously abided by the “no cheering, no jeering” rule that no one clapped after individual candidates spoke; applause was held until the end of the 90-minute forum. The moderator of the event was Randy Bretz.

In a rare display of political unanimity all eight candidates agreed humans played a role in climate change and all agreed to disavow negative campaigning and attack ads. All council candidates also indicated some level of support for local environmental efforts in their answers. They also agreed on supporting and improving Lincoln’s older neighborhoods. Each candidate addressed the issue of how to best remove ash trees infected by the Emerald Ash Borer.

Don't Forget to Get Registered and Vote in the May 2 General Election

City residents who have moved, changed their name or want to change their political party affiliation must register or update their registration before the May 2 General Election. There are two deadlines:

1. Friday, April 14, is the deadline for registrations mailed in or completed on-line through the Secretary of State’s website at nebraska.gov/apps-sos-voter-registration/
2. Friday, April 21, is the deadline for registering in person at the Election Commissioner’s Office located at 601 N. 46th Street. Office hours are weekdays, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., but will remain open until 6 p.m. on the Friday deadline.

Voting By Mail

If you are already a registered voter, the easiest way to vote is by mail. To request a mail ballot simply call the Election Commission at (402) 441-7311 and one will be sent to you. You may mail in your voted ballot or hand-deliver it.

- If you are mailing your ballot, you’ll need to put a first-class stamp on the envelope.
- If hand-delivering your ballot, a drive-up Drop Box is located on the north side of the Election Office near the main entrance. (no postage required)
- All ballots must be received at the Election Office no later than 8:00 PM on Election Day.

If you have questions about registering to vote or voting contact the Election Commission Office during regular work hours. Staff who answer the phones are trained in the rules and can quickly provide answers.

As you undertake your spring cleaning projects, consider gathering items to sell as part of the annual Witherbee Neighborhood Garage Sales event! The annual neighborhood-wide garage sale event will be held Thursday-Saturday June 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, 2017. Registering your garage sale with WNA for only \$5.00 means you'll receive a LOT of advertising that will translate into foot traffic (and sales!) at your garage sale. Your registration fee helps us place ads in the Lincoln Journal Star. Additionally, information about your sale will be posted to the WNA website, Craigslist, multiple Facebook pages, as well as local radio stations and event calendars. Think of the time you'll save when all of this advertising is done for you. Please spread the word about this opportunity to your family and friends in the neighborhood!

During the days of the sales, large yellow signs will be placed at various high-traffic points around the perimeter of the neighborhood to bring people into Witherbee. Each registered garage sale participant will also get a sign to display in their front yard. Committee members and neighbors who held garage sales last year heard many positive comments about the visibility of the signs.

If you decide to hold a garage sale and register your sale with WNA, there are a few things you should know. First, you should fill out and return the registration form and \$5.00 no later than Friday, May 25. In order to guarantee your sale gets full advertising, it is important to mail the information in by the deadline. If you would like to register your sale after May 25, you will need to call the committee chairperson (listed below). Late registrations are \$10.00. When you are completing the

registration form, keep in mind that you get to pick the days (June 1, 2, and/or 3) and the times for your sale. On May 30th or 31st a member of the garage sale committee will deliver to you a WNA Garage Sales yard sign as well as a stack of maps with a list of all WNA garage sales. Please share the maps with your shoppers to encourage them to visit other WNA sales.

Because we plan to use the yard signs for multiple years, we ask that you place the one you receive by your front door after your sale is over so that a member of the committee may pick it up on June 3rd or 4th. You are also free to make your own garage sale signs. If you choose to do so, they should be legible and sturdy. Also, after the sale you should make plans to pick up all the signs that you personally place in the neighborhood. Please note that it is illegal to place garage sale signs on light poles or in the right-of-way.

Still have items left over after your sale? WNA is again participating in the Goodwill Challenge. If you want Goodwill to pick up your leftover items, please indicate on the registration form. Goodwill will do one pick up, starting after 5pm on Saturday, June 3rd. Items must be placed at the curb. If you want a receipt, please call Molly at (402) 438-2022 Ext 118.
