Neighbors are always welcome to bring comments and concerns to this meeting as well.

SCAM ALERT!!!!!!

LPD has recently seen an up rise in a specific 'tech scam' and have issued the following statement to alert all Lincoln citizens of how the scam is presented and how you can prevent becoming a victim.

Hi there!

Recently, I have received a few questions and emails about Tech Support Scams, so I thought it would be a great time to share some prevention information with you.

The way the scam works is the scammer calls, something pops up on your computer or you receive a fake email directing you to a fake website that **tells you that your computer has been infected with a virus**. The scammers pretend to be "Technical Support" and may pretend to work for well-known companies such as Microsoft or Apple. They ask for access to your computer to rectify the problem or to update your version of a certain program. Once they have access to your computer, they are able to install programs that only they have the ability to remove or they are able to access other sensitive information on your computer, such as passwords, banking or credit card information. They will ask you to pay for a non-existing problems or pay for removal of the programs they have now installed.

If this happens to you, here are a few tips to remember:

- **Do not give control of your computer to someone unless YOU initiated the call.** Hang up on anyone you think may be suspicious.
- **Do not purchase any software or services from an unsolicited call or email.** If you are worried about the security of your computer, get advice from a local computer store and make your purchase there.
- Keep your anti-virus software up to date at all times.
- Do not provide your personal or financial information, including your online banking password, to anyone claiming to be technical support.
- **Back-up your files regularly.** Find yourself a portable hard drive or inexpensive USB drive to back-up your important files. Even backing up files once a year can be a huge piece of mind.

If you have experienced a monetary loss, call the Lincoln Police Department at 402-441-6000. If there is no loss, visitftc. gov/complaint to report the scam.

YOU CAN BE A RECYCLING CHAMPION!

One of my goals as Mayor is to increase our City's recycling rate. Our City will take a big step next year with the diversion of

cardboard from our landfill. But another step we can all take right now is to make sure we are recycling the right way - that means keep unwanted items out of our recycling bins. That's the goal of our new educational campaign that encourages everyone in Lincoln to "Be a Recycling Champion!" The campaign is being funded through a grant from the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality.

Every year, more than one million pounds of unacceptable items end up in residential recycling bins. That includes dirty food and beverage containers, Styrofoam and metal items like cooking pans that should be taken to metal scrap yards. When recycling collectors have to go through the bins to remove these items, it costs them time and money.

It's not hard to be a Recycling Champion. The first step is to focus on the basics by recycling paper, cardboard, tin and aluminum cans, and plastic bottles and tubs. Second, check out the recycling guidelines at recycle.lincoln.ne.gov. You'll find the answers to many of your recycling questions, a guide to recycling public drop-off centers, a list of current curbside recycling collectors and their guidelines and a recycling champion quiz to test your knowledge.

The third focus of our campaign is on two items that can cause problems for recyclers - plastic bags and glass. Many curbside recyclers don't accept these items.

Here's the information you need to know:

Plastic bags can clog up recycling equipment and have to be cut out of the machinery, causing delays and safety concerns. Get in the habit of using recyclable shopping bags. Do not put other recyclables in plastic bags. And recycle plastic bags the right way by taking them to convenient collection bins at your grocery store or other retailers. City Council member and local grocer Jane Raybould also reminds us that residents can also recycle other types of clean plastic, such as dry cleaner bags, bread sacks, food storage bags, and produce bags.

Glass causes problems in curbside bins and at the recycling facilities because it breaks so easily. Broken glass can contaminate other recyclables like paper, and national studies suggest as much as 40 percent of the glass placed in mixed recyclables at homes ends up in the landfill. The best way to recycle glass is to take it to one of the 29 public recycling drop-off sites. It doesn't matter if it breaks because it is separated from other recyclables. All of the glass collected at these sites is shipped to a recycler to be made into new bottles and fiberglass insulation.

As part of the campaign, you may find a note stuck on your curbside recycling bin. Participating recycling collectors may leave you with a "Recycling Foul" note listing the unacceptable items in your bin. For those who are recycling right, collectors may leave "Recycling Win" notes instead to thank you for doing a great job!

We know you want to recycle as much as you can. By taking the time to recycle right, you too can "Be a Recycling Champion!"

Woods Park Tennis Complex update...

Slow but Sure, construction at our new Woods Park Tennis Complex is coming along.
