Mark your calendars – the annual Spring Cleanup is Saturday, May 4, 2024 from 8 am to noon. The Witherbee Cleanup is a great way to dispose of unwanted items when cleaning up your garage, yard and home. Many hard to get rid of items, such as mattresses, box springs and old furniture can be disposed of by bringing them to the collection area along M Street directly north of Bryan Community School (48th and M Streets).

In addition to safely disposing of items, the cleanup has a big recycle and reuse component. Tires are taken to Firestone Complete Auto Care at 300 N 66th Street to be recycled. Complete Auto Care has been a generous cleanup partner for many years. No tires mounted on rims are accepted.

Metal and household appliances (washers, dryers, stoves, refrigerators, grills, etc) are delivered to Alter Trading for recycling. Appliances with freon are safely discharged before recycling.

# Witherbee Mediation Team Concerned about Tennis Expansion at Woods Park

The eight members of the Witherbee Mediation team have been busy since forming in September 2024. The members have studied the tennis expansion proposal, gathered input from neighbors, researched the history of Woods Park development and learned about the master plan that guides the development of the park. The group has also met with Woods Park Keep It Green, Woods Park Neighborhood Association members and attended several mediation meetings in the past few months.

Many members attended and provided testimony at the Community Input meetings that were held March 2, 4 and 5, 2024. The meetings were very well attended. JJ Yost, Parks & Rec Planning & facilities manager, presented a brief history of Woods Park and the proposed tennis center expansion. The mediation team presented testimony opposing the expansion to Maggie Stuckey-Ross, Parks and Rec Director and JJ Yost.

One testimonial focused on the continual loss of green space in Woods Park over the last 20 years to tennis facilities, the Woods Park Place building and parking lot expan-

sion. Another team member talked about the loss of trees caused by the tennis & parking lot expansion. A third person presented information on the drainage and storm runoff problems that will be created with rearrangement of the parking lots and additional tennis facilities.

Testimony was given on how Parks & Rec recommends that tournament facilities be built in larger regional parks, not in a community park such as Woods Park. The mediation team, along with many other concerned neighbors made a very good case against changing the Woods Park Master Plan to allow tennis expansion. The mediation team supports building a second tennis facility in a regional park in another area of Lincoln.

The mediation team's next focus is on the Parks & Rec Advisory Board Meeting to be held on Thursday, May 9th, 2024 at Auld Pavilion in Antelope Park, 3200 Memorial Drive. The decision to amend the Woods Park Master Plan will be made by the Lincoln City Council. The action by the city council has not been scheduled but is expected in the next few months.



### **Security Tips:**

**Secure your home:** Do your part to make theft and vandalism unpalatable to criminals. Keep the exterior lights on, install a security system, and if you travel, ensure a neighbor watches your house, picks up mail and newspapers, so it appears you're still at home. Keep your curtains and windows closed at night.

Captain Hubka would also like to remind people to be sure to **lock their vehicles**, never leave valuables inside their vehicles, and call LPD to report any suspicious activity. It is Better-To-Be-Safe: Rather-Than-Sorry. Lincoln has had significant increase in auto thefts, attempted auto thefts, and thefts from vehicles over the last few months. Most of those crimes are occurring overnight and they take a very short

# **Kathie Johnson Plays Heavy Metal**

Kathie Johnson, your Witherbee neighbor, carillonneur at First Plymouth Church's historic carillon at 20th and D Streets, has touched many lives with her gift of music. She moved to Lincoln in 1968 with degrees in music education and church music to teach in the Lincoln Public Schools as well as teaching piano lessons in her home to many children for a number of years.

Kathie met her husband, Ray, who was in the bell tower playing a carillon concert at First-Plymouth in 1968. They have one son, Chris, two grandchildren and one great granddaughter. Ray played the carillon from 1964 to 2003 and Kathie continues to play "heavy metal" music to all of Lincoln. The largest bell is over 5,000 pounds, hence the term "heavy metal."

Ascending the 171-foot tower takes energy and determination to get to the cabin where the instrument is located. Several times a week Kathie goes up two sets of spiral stairs, a set of wooden steps, and climbs a ladder before she can reach the cabin where the console is stationed. The instrument is similar to the layout of an organ. The climate-controlled cabin is under the 57-bell chamber. Kathie plays the carillon by depressing a lever with a slightly closed fist while her feet play the pedal keyboard.

Kathie's gift to all of Lincoln have been concerts for special occasions. These include Celebrating 100 Years of Women's Suffrage with music written by women. Weekly concerts during Covid, which allowed Lincoln's community to sit in their cars and listen to the music of the "Singing Tower." Christmas of 2020, carillon music could be heard as cars stopped by to view the Christmas Nativity the church had on display. Kathie also joined in a world-wide effort to support Ukraine as carillons around the world resounded their bells in an Action for Peace.

With a donation of five-octave handbells to First Plymouth in 1973, Kathie became the first director of the Youth Handbell choir, whose premier was the 1973 Christmas Eve televised service. During the four years Kathie directed the handbell choir, the youth played for church services and dozens of events and festivals. She also had a puppet ministry where she worked with teens teaching the art of puppetry and performing in numerous venues.

Kathie served as Director of Children and Family Ministries from 2005-2013. Retirement has not slowed her down. Hiking up the bell tower to play the carillon for Sunday services, weddings, and special concerts keeps her gift of music resonating from the tower.

Goodwill Industries helps with recycling and reusing electronics and household items.


Brush coupons are also available. Brush coupons allow dumping a load of brush (sticks, twigs, small branches - NO LEAVES or TRASH) at the 48th Street transfer station for free. Only the coupons are provided. Picking up and hauling brush are not part of the WNA cleanup.

Items that CANNOT be accepted include trash, leaves, grass clippings, liquids of any kind (including paint, thinners, stains) ammunition/explosives, LP gas cylinders and CRT televisions and CRT computer monitors.
