Tree-mendous opportunity to be a Tree Hugger in Witherbee

Members of the Witherbee Neighborhood Association enjoyed the Tree Walk on May 31 with Pete Smith, retired Arborist from the Arbor Day Foundation and Lincoln Community Forestry Advisory Board member. As we walked around the double block starting and ending at Redeemer Church, we identified the many types of trees in this area and observed their structure and overall health. This was extremely educational, but ominous regarding the health of trees and the need for planting more trees in Lincoln.

Lincoln's urban forest has been decimated by age, the diseases of Dutch Elm and Emerald Ash Borer, and lack of proper care. Overall, tree coverage in Witherbee has dropped from around 37% to 30% in just 6 years.

Trees for Nebraska Towns, a grant program through the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum, would provide free, high quality street trees for our neighborhood. Members of WNA are reaching out to those who attended the tree walk and to others to determine if there is enough interest to bring this program to the Witherbee neighborhood. This core group of volunteers would help determine where replacement of trees is most needed, assist in planting and follow-up care of newly planted trees (along with the home-owner). Guided by arborist Pete Smith the program would also include community outreach and education of the importance of maintaining/improving our city forest.

Playground to be Renovated at Stuhr Park

The Lincoln Parks and Recreation Department (LPRD) has announced upcoming playground renovations in seven parks across the city, thanks to a Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) Grant. The parks slated for updates consists of Belmont, Filbert, Henry, Herbert, Nevin, Peach, and our Stuhr Park!

What's Coming—

New, Modern Playgrounds – Outdated equipment and safety surfacing will be removed, making way for brandnew, engaging play structures.

Improved Safety & Accessibility – All playgrounds will feature resilient rubber tile surfacing, ensuring a safe and inclusive play environment.

Sustainable Design – With the exception of Herbert Park, all new playgrounds will be rebuilt in their original locations to preserve green space and trees to the extent possible.

This project represents a \$1.2 million investment, with \$600,000 provided by a LWCF grant and a matching \$600,000 from LPRD's Capital Improvement Program (CIP) and private donations secured by the Lincoln Parks Foundation. Lincoln Parks and Recreation staff will handle removal work, while a contractor will complete grading and installation of concrete, resilient surfacing, and play equipment.

Construction is anticipated to begin in Summer of 2025 with survey crews and park staff preparing the sites ahead of the construction season.

June Yard of the Month


